




# EXPERIENCE STEM CAMP

This past spring, the Junior League of Beaumont awarded a \$1,000.00 grant to Family Help Systems in support of their annual one-day **2019 STEM Interactive Experience (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Camp**. The one-day camp's goal was accomplished: the 4th-12th grade students were exposed and introduced to innovative STEM concepts through interactive experiences that cultivated their critical-thinking skills while promoting the diversity of minority careers in STEM fields.



The camp was held at the Lamar Institute of Technology (LIT) Multi-Purpose Center on Friday, July 26, 2019 from 8:00 – 4:00 p.m. In addition to LIT's partnership, the traveling Texas Alliance of Minority Engineers (TAME) Trailblazer, Jefferson County Crime Lab Forensic Workshop, Robots, Vision Boards and other STEM-based concepts were featured.







# HOME

Megan Gibson, a local REALTOR with RE/Max, shared helpful hints and tips for Junior League of Beaumont members who are hoping to buy or sell a house this year!

## Advice for Buyers...

**Why should I hire a real estate agent when buying a home? Can't I do it on my own?**

You want to hire a real estate agent when you're buying a home so you have someone specifically negotiating and advocating for you! Of course you could always do it on your own, but you would probably lose a lot of negotiating power dealing directly with the seller. Also, just from a legal perspective, there's a lot of paperwork involved that you would probably want to get reviewed by an attorney if you were doing it on your own.

**What are the current trends in the home market?**

Farmhouse / Joanna Gaines is still the most popular trend we are seeing right now. My favorite trends are the patterned tiles being used for bathroom flooring, showers, kitchen back splashes, etc. The patterned tile adds such a unique twist and makes the space unique so that you get away from the cookie-cutter vibe you start to see in most new construction houses.

**How much money should I have stashed away for the purchase?**

Our median sale price in Beaumont last month was \$162,000. If you went with a 3-3.5% down payment program, you would probably end up needing to bring between \$10,000 and \$15,000 to closing (worst case). There are ways to make this amount lower, but that's a much longer conversation.

### What other advice would you give buyers?

First and foremost, get pre-approved with a mortgage lender before you even think about looking at houses. You want to know the exact number that you need to bring to closing, as well as what your monthly payment is going to be. It's important to make sure you're comfortable with those numbers before falling in love with a home that turns out to be more than you can afford!

## Advice For Sellers

### What should a seller do to get their house ready for a sale?

**DECLUTTER!** If you do not use something every single day, go ahead and put it in a box, put the box in the garage. Another option is to get a storage unit, and be one step ahead on moving. The tiniest items stand out in pictures and can be distracting.

### Is staging essential?

Yes, you want your house to look like a model home that any family can picture themselves living in, not just how you live in it.

### Should I be present when buyers view my house?

Absolutely not. You want the buyers to feel comfortable there and, again, be able to picture themselves living there. If you are there watching their every move and reaction, they cannot fully relax. Let the real estate agents do their job and sell your home for you.

### Why should I hire a real estate agent when I am selling my house?

Just like when you're buying a home, you want someone specifically advocating and negotiating on your behalf. We can help you with the entire process: pricing, staging, negotiating, paperwork, etc. But most importantly, it's the exposure. By entering your listing into the Multiple Listing Service, it will be sent to way more real estate agents and their clients than just people who come across your listing online or see your sign in the yard.

### What other advice would you give sellers?

Most buyers these days are not interested in a project. They want something "move-in ready" so any updates you can make before putting your home on the market will most likely help your home sell more quickly and for a higher price.

# KIDS' KORNER

BROUGHT TO YOU BY THE BEAUMONT CHILDREN'S MUSEUM



## The POWER of *pretend play*

Children love to pretend and imagine. There is real learning that takes place through this form of play. Pretend play builds critical skills for children while learning about the world around them. Through pretend play, children begin to develop language skills by hearing and using new vocabulary, social

skills while playing with others, empathy when they take on the roles of others, and creativity while using their imagination. These skills will continue to be used for the rest of their lives, so pretend play creates the steppingstones to these lifelong proficiencies.



## How to Encourage Pretend Play

As adults, we sometimes don't make room in our lives for pretend play. We may even forget how to pretend play. It's okay, here are some easy steps to get you and your kids pretending and using imagination daily.

**1 Choose a story setting and a character to play.** There are so many environments to imagine and characters to choose from, even in our day to day lives.

- a. Do you want your setting to be in the office, outside on a boat, climbing a mountain, fighting a fire, or somewhere else?
- b. Professionals: doctor, dentist, chef, waitress, firefighter, etc.
- c. Fantasy: monster, elf, fairy, princess, dinosaur, etc.

**2 Read a book to provide some background knowledge and information about the setting or character that your child has chosen.** This might mean a trip to the library, referring to your personal book collection, or making connections to the real world and other imaginative stories.

**3 Make props!** This can be as simple as using a cardboard box, or as detailed as creating your own village with street signs and restaurants with menus.


- a. Making these types of imaginary play items allows children to work on their writing skills.
- b. When building props, children can work on engineering and creative art skills. They might need to paint or color some of the props. Remember, this is just scratching the surface of all of the different skills used while developing props through imaginary play.

**4 Use real vocabulary when pretend playing.** We often think that we need to simplify our vocabulary when speaking to small children, but it is important to introduce them to new vocabulary and language that is specific to different professions or topics. This provides opportunity for learning about the subject matter and also helps develop language skills. Make your play as real as possible through your language and actions.

**5 Lastly, follow your child's lead!** This can sometimes be difficult. As parents, we should not influence or push our children in the direction that we want them to play, but instead let children use their imagination to enjoy the full benefits of pretend play.

If you find that you are doing the same pretend play over and over again, encourage your child to think about a recent fun experience that he or she has, and see if that leads to new ideas. Start a conversation by using open ended questions about a memory where you know your child had fun, and see where the subject takes you. Or take your child out and about to introduce him or her to some new faces and settings. Remember when playing with your children, make it as real as possible, and introduce them to locals in that profession.



# Banana BREAD

If you read my experience from the last issue of Spinings, you know that I am NOT a cook. But, I am always willing to help out in the kitchen when something needs mixing or chopping (except onions). I am now challenging myself to take some time every month to cook something new from one of the many Junior League cookbooks so that I can learn some new dishes and let you know how they turn out.

With Thanksgiving right around the corner, I thought it would be nice to make a good bread. I'm not sure about you, but I come from a family of Thanksgiving Day snackers. We always are snacking throughout the day while we are waiting for the turkey and dressing to finish cooking. So, I thought why not try my hand at some banana bread, and I did!

## RECIPE: BANANA BREAD

### Beaumont Dining Without Reservations Cookbook

Makes 1 Loaf or 18 Muffins

½ cup (1 stick) margarine, softened  
1 cup of sugar  
1 teaspoon of vanilla extract  
2 eggs  
6 tablespoons of buttermilk  
1 ¾ cup of flour  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
Dash of salt  
3 ripe bananas, mashed  
¾ cups of chopped pecans (optional)

Cream the margarine and sugar in a mixing bowl until light and fluffy. Beat in the vanilla. Add the eggs and beat until well blended. Combine the flour, baking soda and salt in a small bowl. Stir into the creamed mixture; do not overmix. Add the mashed bananas 1 at a time, mixing well after each addition. Stir in the pecans. Pour into a greased and floured loaf pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour. You may also bake in muffin cups. Reduce the baking time to 30 minutes for muffins.

This recipe turned out to be a lot easier than I expected. I have never made a bread/cake/cookie from scratch before, so I was a little nervous – I have always used box cake mixes or easy-bake cookies. When I first read over the recipe, I was a little unsure what overmixing meant, so I phoned a friend (my mom) to show her what I was doing and to make sure to not overmix. (She said I did well!)

I LOVE chocolate and have had chocolate chip banana bread before, so I decided to modify the recipe a little bit. I decided to add ½ cup of semi-sweet chocolate chips to go along with the pecans, and I definitely

recommend doing this if you like chocolate! I didn't have ripened bananas on hand so I looked on the internet and discovered that you can "fake it" when you put bananas on a cookie sheet unpeeled at 250 degrees for 15 -20 minutes in the oven. When you do this, the bananas will be as good as ripened, so that's what I did!

In the end, the bread turned out perfectly, and I definitely will be making this again for the holiday season! I hope you give it a try too! - S** Swords, knives, and other costume accessories should be short, soft, and flexible.
- A** Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- F** Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.
- E** Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Limit the amount of treats you eat.

- H** Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you. WALK and don't run from house to house.
- A** Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.
- L** Look both ways before crossing the street. Use crosswalks wherever possible.
- L** Lower your risk for serious eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses.
- O** Only walk on sidewalks whenever possible or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.
- W** Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips, and falls.
- E** Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers.
- E** Enter homes only if you're with a trusted adult. Only visit well-lit houses. Never accept rides from strangers.
- N** Never walk near lit candles or luminaries. Be sure to wear flame-resistant costumes.

### Expecting trick-or-treaters or party guests?

Follow these tips to help make the festivities fun and safe for everyone:

- Provide healthier treats for trick-or-treaters such as low-calorie treats and drinks. For guests, offer a variety of fruits and vegetables.
- Use party games and trick-or-treat time as an opportunity for kids to get their daily dose of 60 minutes of physical activity.
- Be sure walking areas and stairs are well-lit and free of obstacles that could cause someone to fall.
- Keep candle-lit jack o'lanterns and luminaries away from doorsteps, walkways, landings, and curtains. Place them on sturdy tables, keep them out of the reach of pets and small children, and never leave them unattended.
- Remind drivers to watch out for trick-or-treaters and to drive safely.


